

XprESS may be used to treat certain conditions affecting the sinus above your eyebrows and behind your cheeks. Your physician will need to determine if your condition is one that may benefit from XprESS. Possible side effects include but are not limited to post-operative bleeding, pain and swelling, allergic reaction to anesthesia or other medications administered during the procedure, or infection. Your condition may not respond to this treatment. To learn more about this procedure and the potential risks, ask your physician.
